


#### How Prepared Do You Feel to Manage Your Professional Path? UGn=657, Gn=698


#### How Prepared Do You Feel to Manage Your Professional Path?

#### How Prepared Do You Feel to Manage Professional Path Very prepared + prepared, n=698





# Spotlight

- Over 60% of international students plan to stay in the U.S. for work or study
- International undergraduates start with more uncertainly about their post-graduate plans. As students progress, their uncertainty dissolves and more international undergraduates report plans to work or study inside and outside of the U.S.
- Among graduate students, Master's students plan to stay in the U.S. at the highest rates followed by professional degree students. Doctoral students report the most uncertainty around their postgraduate plans and have the lower rates of planning to stay in the U.S. for work or study.
