COVID-19 Impact & Planning Survey for International Constituents: Analysis by Status Dashew Center for International Students & Scholars (DCISS)

Executive Summary

Where are our international students and scholars during Spring 2020? Most international students and scholars reside in the Pacific Time Zone; however, undergraduates and non-degree students left the U.S. at the highest rates. Top time zones for undergraduate degree students include: China Standard Time, Indian Standard Time, Korea Standard Time, Singapore Time, and Gulf Standard Time. Due to the vast number of undergraduate degree students who left the U.S. it would be beneficial to offer virtual programming and events during a time that is accessible to those residing outside the U.S.

Which virtual events and programs draw the most interest? International students and scholars do not report overwhelming interest in virtual events and programs. However, constituents of every type show interest in a virtual visa Q&A. Career-related virtual workshops and one-on-one advising with career counselors also drew interest.

What concerns international students and scholars the most during this time? On average, the top three concerns for all constituents include: ability to get back to the U.S. when they want to, their family's well-being, and ability to get to their home country when they want to. Additionally:

- Undergraduate degree students also expressed concern about learning in an online, remote environment,
- Non-degree students expressed concern about their mental health,
- Undergraduate and graduate degree students who have jobs but who cannot work remotely reported the most financial concern when compared to their peers, and
- Constituents from Asia reported the most concern over discrimination directed at them.

Virtual programming and events as well as communications focusing on these top concerns would likely help to reduce anxiety among international students and scholars.

Are those with jobs or internships afforded the opportunity to work remotely? Nearly all graduate degree students, scholars, and employment-based international constituents are afforded the opportunity to work remotely. Undergraduate degree students and non-degree students are afforded this opportunity less often, which may leave them financially vulnerable.

How many international constituents plan to participate in CPT, OPT, or AT in the next 6 months? About a quarter to one third of international students and scholars hope to participate in CPT in the next 6 months. A third or more of international students and scholars hope to participate in OPT or AT with the exception of non-degree students who do not report plans for OPT or AT at such high rates. Demand for career development remains relatively stable; therefore, the demand for remote work does as well so long as the Safer at Home orders remain in place.

Therefore, efforts to support international constituents' ability to find appropriate opportunities for CPT, OPT, and AT that also offer remote work will be instrumental to supporting the goals of students and scholars.

Method

The Dashew Center administered a survey to international students, scholars, and employees beginning April 3, 2020 and ending April 14, 2020. The purpose of the survey was to understand:

- 1. international constituents' upcoming needs and programming interests, and
- 2. the impact of COVID-19 on their UCLA experience

Descriptive data were disaggregated by constituent type to reveal responses by type.

Definitions

CPT: Curricular Practical Training is work authorization for international students holding an F-1 visa when they participate in paid or unpaid work *before* they graduate UCLA.

OPT: Optional Practical Training is work authorization for international students holding an F-1 visa when they participate in work *after* they graduate UCLA.

AT: Academic Training is work authorization for international students or scholars holding a J-1 visa when they participate in paid or unpaid work *during* or *after* their program at UCLA.
